A young lady confidently walked around the room with a raised glass of water while leading a seminar and explaining stress management to her audience. Everyone knew she was going to ask the ultimate question, 'Half empty or half full?' She fooled them all. "How heavy is this glass of water?" she inquired with a smile. Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. to 20 oz.

She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm."


"If I hold it for a day, you'll probably have to call an ambulance. In each case it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes."

"So, as early in the evening as you can, put all your burdens down. Don't carry them through the evening and into the night. Pick them up again tomorrow if you must."

Notice on Bulky Trash Pick-up

In February, the 4th Monday was the last day of the month, confusing neighbors who thought pickup was the last week of the month. Bulky trash pickup is not always the last week of the month. It depends on where the 4th Monday falls, which can sometimes be the last day of the month. Fortunately February is the only month this year that this happens.

Dallas Code Compliance is getting ready to add 45 new officers, possibly making more frequent checks likely.

To help you avoid being fined, and to remind you when to set out your bulky trash, WHNA volunteers will post signs at two points along Whispering Hills. They will appear on the Thursday you can put things out on the curb for pickup that occurs the following week. The trucks sometimes come by early on Monday morning so be sure to have your things out by Sunday evening.

The signs will be removed the following Sunday. If you don't see signs, it's not the week for set-out, or it's too late. Sometimes you may be able to sneak a few items out after Sunday if the trucks are late in getting to the neighborhood.

You can get the calendar for the whole year at dallascityhall.com and click on Departments at the very top of the page. Go to Sanitation > Residential Services > Brush and Bulky Items. Toward the bottom of the page find "Get a Calendar." You can even "Get a Reminder" on your cell phone or by email!!

Did You Know....?

All those cardboard boxes are recyclable? Flatten and put them into the Blue Bin.

And...Glass, Mirrors, and Electronics should NOT be placed out for bulky trash (curb) pickup.

Northeast PD Criminal Activity Report By Lt. Nichols, Day Commander

Violent crime is down for non-family violence. Family violence is flat.

Violent Crime Plan Update

<u>Phase 1</u>: Grid Patrols – Currently there are 11 grids active in Northeast Division with 7 grids active in District 10

Phase 2: Place Network Investigations – Currently there are none active in District 10 but there are some in the rest of Northeast DPD area. Each shift has officers assigned to areas considered Hot Spots in District 10, i.e. Forest and Audelia. Officers are assigned to make drivethroughs of these areas multiple times during each shift.

Quality of Life Crimes

More patrols are now focused on speeding, street racing, loud music, homelessness.

Community Prosecutor's Report By Ariya Villegas, District 10 Prosecutor

Eight properties handled as nuisances in District 10: 4 multi-family, 2 hotels, 1condo and 1 single family residence

A question was asked about FM Food Mart and the Walnut/Audelia intersection and how many incidents, and to what level of severity, have to be connected to a single address or area to be entered into the nuisance system. A general answer was given that a prosecutor's detective would be assigned to check out recent police reports.

Can Your Emergency Contacts Be Reached From Your Mobile Phone?

Recently a neighbor unexpectedly lost his wife. She was in line at the drive through at Sonic when workers wondered why she wasn't moving her car, Then they discovered she wasn't moving in the car either.

Police and an ambulance were called. Her phone was found in the car, but there was no clue on the lock screen as to who to call to let them know the person's situation. Fortunately the phone was left at the nurses' station and her phone rang, providing access to a contact.

Both Android and iPhones have ways to enter emergency information for use in these types of situations. Unfortunately, there is some inconsistency among models on how to do it. However, you can google "How to enter emergency info into iPhone (or android)" to see the procedure that may work on your phone.

There is some confusion on how a lock screen can be opened by someone other than the phone's owner. There may be some way to simply add the phone number of someone other than yourself to the lock screen.

Another way to provide emergency information is simply to put it on paper and stick it in your wallet with your drivers' license.

Email Cyber Attack Warning Information

With the escalating Russia-Ukraine conflict there is an increased likelihood of cyber-attacks against US companies. Extra scrutiny and vigilance should be taken regarding all social engineering activities prior to opening attachment or clicking on website links within emails.

What You Can Do

- Never send sensitive information such as a user ID, password, bank details, social security number, etc. over email.
- Be mindful of who is emailing you. Check email addresses for accuracy and look for signs of suspicious activity, for example if an email is not in the format you'd expect, or a name appears to be spelled incorrectly.
- Hover over links WITHOUT CLICKING the destination will show in the bottom left of your screen and you can see whether it looks right.
- Treat any attachment that you didn't request or were not expecting as highly suspect.

Meet Some of Your Neighborhood Nurses

Sierra Hawkins

My husband, Matt, and I have lived in Whispering Hills since October 2020 and are first-time home owners. We've loved the location, and feel like our home is the best place as we welcomed our first baby girl, Maeve, this last fall!

I work at Medical City Dallas hospital in the Bone Marrow Transplant/Oncology unit. I have the privilege of caring for people with Leukemia, Lymphoma, and other bone marrow cancers from the moment they are diagnosed and throughout the rest of their treatment.

My job has the perfect balance between emergent critical thinking and relational capacity. I really enjoy

getting to care for my patients for long periods of time as they come and go for multiple treatments. I've been able to care for some of my patients for over 2 years through all the highs and lows, which is special in healthcare. I get to know them and their family, and they feel like my family now, too. I also enjoy the occasional adrenaline rush and the thrill of knowing you played a part in saving someone's life.

Covid has significantly changed my job. The hospital has limited visitors and interactions with staff members for everyone's safety, so nurses have learned to fill many different roles to better care for our patients. Not only are we their nurse, but also their friend, advocate, educator, housekeeper, nutritionist, etc. I wish I could say it's gotten easier, but despite Covid's recent downward trend my job has kept the same difficulties since the beginning of the pandemic because our patients are extremely high risk and staffing is scarce. Nonetheless, the people I get to care for are worth it!



Marlo Cooper

We moved to Whispering Hills about 6 1/2 years ago. We like the location of the neighborhood and that the kids still would be in Richardson Independent School District. We liked the layout of the house, and the neighborhood was quiet. I have been married

for almost 22 years to my handsome husband. We have six children and the last two currently attend Richardson High School.

I work for HCA Center for Clinical advancement. I am the Division Manager of Simulation and Technology. My responsibilities include coordinating educational programs and realistic clinical scenarios with the clinical educators and other simulation facilitators throughout the North Texas division. We provide orientation training and ongoing company for nurse residents and experienced clinical staff. We also provide CPR and adult and child advance life support classes for Medical City Healthcare.

I am also a Learning Lab Instructor for Western Governors University Pre-Licensure Nursing Program. In this role, I teach skills and facilitate realistic scenarios to validate competency prior to clinical course practices.

I enjoy seeing the growth of the individual and the group over time, ensuring clinical competence and confidence which has a positive impact on clinical outcomes. The patient and families deserve the very best experience every single time. If I can provide training to ensure excellent care that is what matters the most.

At the beginning of COVID, we had to rapidly evolve with our training methodology to meet the needs of staff with the information and training needs changing so often. We did frequent rounding, added special training classes, assisted with monitoring, filled in with staffing as needed on the units and in the vaccine clinics. Now as the COVID numbers have started to decline, have started to shift from doing virtual classes, to providing more live classes and clinical scenarios to help to enhance learning in the clinical environment. We continue to explore innovative ideas to extend learning to all staff by acting out scenarios in live and virtual clinical environment to better manage patient diagnosis and to more effectively manage systems.



Roxanne Singletary

My husband, Nate, and our daughter, Lois, moved here in December 2021. We like the homes in this area and enjoy the proximity to family and work. I grew up in Richardson and Lake Highlands, so I like the familiarity of the location.

I work at Baylor's Rehab hospital in Dallas as a floor nurse and House Supervisor. We treat patients with spinal cord injuries, strokes, traumatic brain injuries, and those recovering from orthopedic procedures. After Covid, we started seeing an influx of patients who were in need of rehabilitation after the debilitating effects of Covid. Many of them had been on a ventilator for months.

I love working with our patients and seeing how much progress is made in the weeks to months of extensive therapy. It is so rewarding to see patients learn to walk again and regain strength and cognitive abilities. I believe our real heroes are the therapists in our facility. It's also important to give their caregivers some respite from the struggles of caring for their loved ones in difficult times.

When I think back to all of the uncertainty we were facing in the early days of the virus, I am proud that we were innovative in dealing with the challenges we faced. We lost coworkers before vaccines were available and have felt that void.

We also admitted patients that were probably not quite stable enough for rehab and we would have to send them back to receive a higher level of care. Staffing shortages and inventory of materials continue to be an issue for our facility as well as most other industries these days. I am curious to see if some of the nurses and other healthcare workers go back to working at the bedside or continue to work in other capacities.

It is nice that we are able to have family and friends visit their loved ones again in rehab because some of them will be in our hospital for months after already going through an extensive list of medical procedures in acute settings.

We are seeing our census continue to climb recently and that likely reflects those who are now able to have elective surgeries they have needed for the past few years.

We moved to Whispering Hills in 1995 because it was close to our church and to my work, though not close to my husband's. Cal worked at Six Flags as the manager of security. I love the size and closeness of our little community. We live on the bulb of a cul de sac, and we love the privacy that affords. The big back yard,

gives us space for our large vegetable garden and chickens.

I retired August of 2020 after working as a nurse for 45 years. I think I earned the retirement. I wore many hats during my career, including pediatrics, NICU, dialysis, transplant, child and adolescent psych, and ending quietly for an insurance company. It is a joy to be able to help those who financially are unable to afford good medical care.

I was still working when Covid hit, but had been working at home for several years, so it didn't impact me professionally at all.
