If You're Against STRs in Our Neighborhoods, Let Our Councilman Know Now

Whispering Hills neighbors that are concerned about Short-Term Rentals in our neighborhood causing "Loss of Neighborhood" in so many ways, should let our City Councilman, Adam McGough, know of their concerns and experiences by emails and phone calls. The concern comes in the form of unknown people not owning or living



long-term in rental property, causing crime and safety issues in the neighborhood. A majority of STR owners do not live on the property or in the City or even in Texas. Some STR owners are investment businesses set up to own and operate 20 or more properties in the city limits of Dallas and other cities.

Since 2019, when the first reports of nuisances and criminal activities in Whispering Hills started to be reported to the WHNA Crime Watch group, the number of known STRs has grown from 1 to 4. Owners of STRs are supposed to register and pay Hotel Occupancy Taxes (HOT) which, as of a few months ago, had not been done by any of them. Hotels and motels must pay the HOT as required by law.

The Zoning Use question has been through multiple city committees, all approving the existing zoning standards for use of property. The Keep It Simple Solutions (KISS) zoning proposal would provide the clearest, brightest line for where STRs can and cannot legally operate in Dallas. I would protect ALL residences, in single family and multi-family zoning categories.

If you feel strongly that you did not buy your home with the intention that any commercial type of business could open up next door to you, then you need to send your email now. Any delay will let current council persons "Kick the Can Down the Road" to the next city council and the State of Texas possibly overriding the City of Dallas' Home Rule status.

D10 Report from Councilman Adam McGough

What a year 2022 was for our entire city and the District 10 community. In 2022, my colleagues and I voted at the horseshoe in support of an updated redistricting map that'll last for a decade. We authorized the establishment of a new Economic Development Corporation to support business development and serve as a public developer within our city. We reduced the property-tax rate by 2.75 cents, the largest decrease in over 40 years. We passed a new, balanced \$4.75 billion FY 2022-23 Budget, which includes a total investment of over \$1.03 billion to support our Dallas Police and Fire-Rescue Departments' efforts to keep our residents safe and significant investments to reform the city's building-permit process, support housing and homelessness solutions, expand library hours, strengthen code enforcement and improve the city's infrastructure.

In District 10, we celebrated the next major Skillman intersection milestone of the \$1.74 billion 635 East Project: the opening of the temporary bridge at Skillman and 635. I was honored to recognize at my seventh annual Blake Anderson Public Service Award Ceremony nine new award recipients who, like Blake Anderson did, embody the meaning of "love your neighbor." During one of the most significant celebrations I've participated in as a public servant, we commemorated the grand reopening of our Willie B. Johnson Recreation Center in Hamilton Park. And, recently, the Skillman Corridor TIF District Board voted to amend its zone boundary to include Forest-Audelia and dedicate up to \$5,551,590 to support the design and construction of a park and multipurpose center at Forest-Audelia. This funding is critical to the execution of this long-overdue, transformational project.

Our community should feel proud as we reflect on 2022. As we look toward the new year, it's hard to believe I have less than five months remaining in my fourth-and-final term as your councilmember. You have my commitment that I'll sprint to the June 2023 finish line and continue to go ALL in for our neighbors.

Three Candidates Have Announced Their Intention to Run for the D10 Council Seat

Our current Council Representative, Adam McGough, is term limited after being elected to 4 terms. City council members serve two-year terms, and elections are held on odd-numbered years. All City Council members are up for election or reelection.

Three people have put their name in the hat to run for the District 10 seat in the Saturday, May 6th election: Kathy Stewart, Brian Hasenbauer, and Sirrano Keith Baldeo. Kathy Stewart announced she has officially filed to represent D10

Whomever gets elected, our neighborhood needs to make sure the person is aware that we are here and what our needs are. The tendency is for emphasis to be on the Lake Highlands neighborhoods since that is where most of the D10 Council reps reside. Our area is called North Lake Highlands.

Other Reports of Activity in D10

The Skillman Corridor TIF District Board voted to amend its zone boundary to include Forest-Audelia and dedicate up to \$5,551,590 to support the transformational project of the design and construction of a park and multipurpose center at Forest-Audelia.

The 635 East Project construction project is progressing on schedule. Skillman Bridge steel erection should begin in early 2023. Construction of walls along eastbound I-635 and westbound I-635 on the north and south sides of the intersection are nearly complete.

Phyllis Nobles was promoted to the rank of major on January 3 and began her tenure at Northeast on January 4. She comes to Northeast with over three decades of experience working in the Dallas Police Department and looks forward to getting to know and partnering with neighbors to promote safety across District 10.

Let's Make Sure the City Knows What We Need Done to Make Our Streets Safe

Requests for street, curb, and gutter repairs should be submitted through 311. The request should include block numbers and between which streets. The reason for calling 311 is that there is a record of the request and a person with the required department must reply to you by email or call by a certain time. Always ask for an email from whoever replies to you so that you have a record that you can save.

Mental Health Hotline

Call 988

People experiencing a mental health crisis can now simply call or text 988.

The new number is modeled after 911 to quickly connect people in a mental crisis with a mental health professional at a crisis center closest to them. If that center is busy, the call gets sent to a back-up center.

New Kind of Crime--Plate Swapping

Criminals are now committing a new kind of crime against law-abiding citizens called "License Plate Swapping". They are banking on vehicle owners not knowing their license plate numbers and never really paying attention to them on their own vehicles.

The criminals go out and search for vehicles similar to the ones they plan to use in a crime and swap the good plates with the ones they plan to put on the vehicle used in the crime. After the crime is reported, some security camera may capture a picture of the vehicle and it's license plate. The next thing the good citizen knows, is that they are getting pulled over by law en-

forcement as suspects in the crime. In addition, the criminal's vehicle is not insured, driver may have a suspended license, and the crime vehicle may be stolen.



Things to do to protect yourself:

- -- Take a picture on your phone of your license plates.
- --Look at your license plates occasionally when going to your vehicle.
- --Don't frame your plates; it makes them easier to remove with a crowbar.
- --Special Security License Plate screws and caps are available.

- There is a limit of two (2) garage sales at a premise during any twelve (12) month period (**NOT** by calendar year) and each sale may not exceed more than three (3) consecutive calendar days in length.
- Signs must be placed on private property; Signs placed on medians, public property or utility poles are illegal
- Signs must be removed within 24 hours of sale.
- 1st Garage Sale -No Fee
- 2nd Garage Sale -\$25.00 (No Cash)


Where to See Bald Eagles

January through March is the perfect time to look for the iconic bald eagle. It's their nesting season, which means there's a lot of activity. Bald eagles reuse the same giant nest year after year, which makes it easier for you to find them.

To locate eagles nearby, use iNaturalist bald eagle observations, where you can also report your own sighting. Help biologists keep track of active nests with Texas Nature Trackers project Texas Eagle Nests.

Bald eagles were on the endangered species list from 1966-2006 due to pesticide poisoning. A conservation success story, they're now thriving. Take the time to see these magnificent birds in the wild, and share your observations.
